Brittany Anne Murphy-Monjack (née Bertolotti; November 10, 1977 – December 20, 2009), better known as Brittany Murphy, was an American actress and singer, famous for playing Tai Frasier in the teen film *Clueless* (1995), Alex Latourno in *8 Mile* (2002), Daisy Randone in *Girl, Interrupted* (1999), Molly Gunn in *Uptown Girls* (2003), Sarah in *Just Married* (2003) and Gloria in *Happy Feet* (2006). She was also known for her equal mastery of the comedy and drama genres.

Born in Atlanta, her parents Angelo Bertolotti and Sharon Murphy divorced when she was two years old. She moved to Los Angeles as a teenager and began her acting career at thirteen. Her breakthrough role was Tai Frasier in *Clueless* (1995), followed by supporting roles in independent films such as *Freeway* (1996) and *Bongwater* (1998). She made her theatrical debut in a Broadway production of Arthur Miller's *A View from the Bridge* in 1997, before starring as Daisy Randone in *Girl, Interrupted* (1999) and Lisa Swenson in *Drop Dead Gorgeous* (1999).

In the 2000s, she played the patient Elisabeth Burrows in *Don't Say a Word* (2001), alongside Michael Douglas, and Alex Latourno in *8 Mile* (2002), for which she garnered critical acclaim. Her subsequent roles included *Riding in Cars with Boys* (2001), *Spun* (2002), *Just Married* (2003), *Uptown Girls* (2003), *Sin City* (2005), and *Happy Feet* (2006). She also voiced the character Luanne Platter in the animated television series *King of the Hill* (1997–2010). On *The Ramen Girl* (2008), she served as a producer in addition to acting. Her most recent film project was *Something Wicked*, a film released in April 2014 and later released on home video.

She also dabbled in music, being able to sing and play the piano and trumpet during her childhood. In the early 1990s, she was part of the band *Blessed Soul*, alongside actor Eric Balfour. No plans to release an album were pursued. In 2006, she featured on British DJ Paul Oakenfold's single "Faster Kill Pussycat", and that same year, she covered two songs: Queen's "Somebody to Love" and Earth, Wind & Fire's "Boogie Wonderland" for the soundtrack of the film *Happy Feet*.

On December 20, 2009, Murphy died under controversial circumstances at the age of 32. The coroner's verdict stated that the cause of death was pneumonia, exacerbated by anemia and addiction to several prescription medications. Five months after her death, her husband, Simon Monjack, died of the same causes as her. The Los Angeles County Department of Health Services had considered toxic mold emanating from

their home as a possible cause of death; however, Los Angeles Deputy Coroner Ed Winter stated that there were "no indicators" that mold was a factor. In January 2012, the actress's father, Angelo Bertolotti, filed a petition in the Superior Court of California suggesting that the Los Angeles County Coroner's Office release hair samples from his daughter for independent testing, claiming she was poisoned. In November 2013, he claimed that a toxicology report showed that deliberate poisoning by heavy metals, including antimony and barium, was a possible cause of death.

Following her death, a series of biographical documentaries were made about her life. The *Brittany Murphy Story*—starring Amanda Fuller as Murphy, Sherilyn Fenn as her mother Sharon, and Eric Petersen as Monjack—aired on Lifetime on September 6, 2014. It received negative reviews from the media, who criticized Fuller's poor performance. In 2020, another documentary called *Brittany Murphy: An ID Mystery* aired on Investigation Discovery, where the documentary filmmakers go into more detail about her death. A year later, the streaming service HBO Max released the two-part miniseries *What Happened, Brittany Murphy?* (2021), which featured several people close to the actress, including Kathy Najimy, Taryn Manning, Lisa Rieffel, and director Amy Heckerling. In 2023, another streaming service called Tubi released a new documentary called *Gone Before Her Time: Brittany Murphy*, which also explored her personal life and death.

It is a sequel to the long-running 1986 musical *The Phantom of the Opera* and was loosely adapted from Forsyth's 1999 novel *The Phantom of*

Manhattan.

The plot is not based on the storyline in the original 1910 novel by Gaston Leroux. Lloyd Webber stated, "I don't regard this as a sequel—it's a stand-alone piece." He later clarified, "Clearly, it is a sequel, but I really do not believe that you have to have seen Phantom of the Opera to understand Love Never Dies." Glenn Slater subsequently explained that Lloyd Webber "didn't view it as a sequel as much as 'a second story with these characters'". The musical is set in 1907, which Lloyd Webber states is "ten years roughly after the end of the original Phantom", although the events of the original actually took place in 1881.

In the show, Christine Daaé is invited by Oscar Hammerstein I for her American debut, until an anonymous impresario contracts her to perform at Phantasma, a new attraction on Coney Island. With her husband Raoul and son Gustave in tow, she journeys to Brooklyn, apparently unaware it is actually the Phantom who has arranged her appearance in the popular beach resort.

Although Lloyd Webber began working on Love Never Dies in 1990, it was not until 2007 that he began writing the music. The show opened at the Adelphi Theatre in London's West End on 9 March 2010, with previews from 22 February 2010. It was originally directed by Jack O'Brien and choreographed by Jerry Mitchell, starring Ramin Karimloo and Sierra Boggess. However, the show closed for four days in November 2010 for substantial re-writes, which were overseen by Lloyd Webber, and it re-opened with new direction from Bill Kenwright. Set and costume designs were by Bob Crowley. The original London production received mostly negative reviews. A subsequent Australian production starring Ben Lewis and Anna O'Byrne, featuring an entirely new design team and heavy revisions was generally better received, although the show finally closed with heavy discounting to tickets. A planned Broadway production, which was to have opened simultaneously with the West End run, was cancelled, the amount of negative press having deterred potential backers. In 2023, the revised Australian version of the show made its West End premiere in a concert run starring Norm Lewis and Celinde Schoenmaker.

Eydie Gormé

Eydie Gormé (EE-dee; born Edith Gormezano; August 16, 1928 – August 10, 2013) was an American singer who achieved notable success in pop, Latin, and jazz genres. She sang solo and in the duo Steve and Eydie with her husband, Steve Lawrence, on albums and television. She also performed on Broadway and in Las Vegas.

Born in the Bronx, New York, Gormé began her career singing in a band on weekends while working as a translator. She gained prominence after appearing on the radio program Cita Con Eydie and changing her name for easier pronunciation. Gormé's career took off in the early 1950s, starting with her two-month stint with the Tommy Tucker band, followed by a year with Tex Beneke's band. She signed with Coral Records in 1952, releasing her first single and later joining The Tonight Show, where she met Lawrence. The duo's success included the hits "Too Close for Comfort" and "Blame It on the Bossa Nova", with Gormé also achieving solo success and earning Grammy Awards and nominations.

Her marriage to Lawrence in 1957 marked the beginning of a lifelong personal and professional partnership, celebrated with their Emmy-winning television specials and performances alongside stars such as Frank Sinatra. Gormé was renowned for her recordings in Spanish, particularly with Trio Los Panchos, which solidified her international fame. Her versatility was evident in her wide-ranging discography, which includes albums such as Amor and Eydie Swings the Blues. Gormé's contributions to music were recognized with awards, including a Grammy Award for Best Female Pop Vocal Performance and a Society of Singers Lifetime Achievement Award.

The first season of One Tree Hill, an American teen drama television series created by Mark Schwahn, began airing on September 23, 2003, on The WB television network. The season concluded on May 11, 2004, after 22 episodes.

The series premiere was watched by 2.5 million viewers and achieved a 1.9 Adults 18–49 rating on September 23, 2003. However, the following week it rose to 3.3 million viewers and a 2.4 demo, becoming only one of three shows to rise in its second episode in the 2003–2004 TV season. The overall first season averaged 3.84 million viewers, ranking #136 with 1.5 rating.

Warner Home Video released the complete first season, under the title of One Tree Hill: The Complete First Season, on January 25, 2005, as a six-disc boxed set.

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
